Dear Members of the Board:

We have audited the financial statements of The Bellin Health Foundation, Inc. (the "Foundation") for the year ended September 30, 2019, and have issued our report thereon dated January 22, 2020. Professional standards require that we provide you with the following information related to our audit.

Our Responsibility Under Auditing Standards Generally Accepted in the United States

As stated in our engagement letter dated October 11, 2019, our responsibility, as described by professional standards, is to express an opinion about whether the financial statements prepared by management with your oversight are fairly presented, in all material respects, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (GAAP). Our audit of the financial statements does not relieve you or management of your responsibilities.

Other Information in Documents Containing Audited Financial Statements

The auditor's responsibility for other information in documents containing audited financial statements does not extend beyond the financial information identified in our report, and we have no obligation to perform any procedures to corroborate other information contained in a document. Our responsibility is to read the other information and consider whether such information, or the manner of its presentation, is materially inconsistent with information, or the manner of its presentation, appearing in the financial statements.

We are not aware of any documents or other information containing audited financial statements; and, furthermore, management has not requested use to devote attention to any documents containing audited financial statements.

Planned Scope and Timing of the Audit

We performed the audit according to the planned scope and timing previously communicated to your representatives, Mr. Jim Dietsche, Ms. Julie Graceffa, and Ms. Sara Arndt, in our meeting about planning matters, in addition to our engagement letter dated October 11, 2019, accepted by Mr. Dietsche on behalf of the Foundation.

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by the Foundation are described in Note 1 to the financial statements. In 2019, the Foundation adopted Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2016-14, *Not-for-Profit Entities* (Topic 958). This ASU provides certain improvements in financial reporting for not-for-profit organizations and requires changes to net asset classification, enhancements to liquidity presentation and disclosures, presentation of an analysis of expenses by function and by nature, netting investment expenses with return, amount other changes. The application of existing policies, other than the policy noted above, have not changed during 2019.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. The most sensitive estimate affecting the financial statements was the present value of the unconditional promises to give.

The disclosures in the financial statements are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are clearly trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Management has corrected all such misstatements. In addition, none of the misstatements detected as a result of audit procedures and corrected by management were material, either individually or in the aggregate, to the financial statements taken as a whole.

We proposed no audit adjustments that could, in our judgement, either individually or in the aggregate have a significant effect on the Foundation's financial reporting process.

Disagreements With Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not, in our judgment, a condition of our retention.

This representation letter is provided in connection with your audits of the financial statements of The Bellin Health Foundation, Inc. (the "Foundation"), which comprise the statements of financial position as of September 30, 2019 and 2018 and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements for the purpose of expressing an opinion as to whether the financial statements are presented fairly, in all material respects in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (GAAP).

Certain representations in this letter are described as being limited to matters that are material. Items are considered material, regardless of size, if they involve an omission or misstatement of accounting information that, in light of surrounding circumstances, makes it probable that the judgment of a reasonable person relying on the information would be changed or influenced by the omission or misstatement. An omission or misstatement that is monetarily small in amount could be considered material as a result of qualitative factors.

We confirm, to the best of our knowledge and belief as of the date of this letter, the following representations made to you during your audits.

Financial Statements

1. We have fulfilled our responsibilities, as set out in the terms of the audit engagement letter dated October 11, 2019.
2. The financial statements referred to above are fairly presented in conformity with GAAP.
3. We acknowledge our responsibility for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.
4. We acknowledge our responsibility for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control to prevent and detect fraud.
5. Significant assumptions we used in making accounting estimates, including those measured at fair value, are reasonable.
6. Related party relationships and transactions have been appropriately accounted for and disclosed in accordance with the requirements of GAAP.
7. All events subsequent to the date of the financial statements and for which GAAP requires adjustment or disclosure have been adjusted or disclosed.
8. We agree with the adjusting journal entries proposed by you and which are given effect to in the financial statements. *None in 2019.*
9. The effects of uncorrected misstatements are immaterial, both individually and in the aggregate, to the financial statements as a whole. A list of the uncorrected misstatements is attached to the representation letter: *None in 2019.*

10. The effects of all known actual or possible litigation, claims, and assessments have been accounted for and disclosed in accordance with GAAP.
11. Material concentrations have been properly disclosed in accordance with GAAP.
12. Guarantees, whether written or oral, under which the Foundation is contingently liable, have been properly recorded or disclosed in accordance with GAAP.
13. We accept responsibility for and have designated an individual with suitable skill, knowledge, or experience to oversee the following nonattest services:
 - a. Financial statement preparation
 - b. Tax return preparation
 - c. Miscellaneous accounting and operational consulting


Information Provided

14. We have provided you with:
 - a. Access to all information, of which we are aware, that is relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements, such as records, documentation, and other matters.
 - b. Additional information that you have requested from us for the purpose of the audit.
 - c. Unrestricted access to persons within the Foundation from who you determined it necessary to obtain audit evidence.
15. We have disclosed to you the results of our assessment of the risk that the financial statements may be materially misstated as a result of fraud.
16. We have no knowledge of any allegations of fraud or suspected fraud affecting the Foundation involving:
 - a. Management.
 - b. Employees who have significant roles in internal control.
 - c. Others where the fraud could have a material effect on the financial statements.
17. We have no knowledge of any allegations of fraud or suspected fraud affecting the Foundation's financial statements communicated by employees, former employees, regulators, or others.
18. We have disclosed to you all known instances of noncompliance or suspected noncompliance with laws and regulations whose effects should be considered when preparing financial statements.
19. All material transactions have been recorded in the accounting records and are reflected in the financial statements.
20. We are not aware of any pending or threatened litigation, claims, or assessments or unasserted claims or assessments that are required to be accrued or disclosed in the financial statements in accordance with GAAP.
21. We have disclosed to you the identity of the Foundation's related parties and all the related party relationships and transactions of which we are aware.

22. The Foundation has satisfactory title to all owned assets, and there are no liens or encumbrances on such assets nor has any material asset been pledged, except as disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.
23. The Foundation has identified all accounting estimates that could be material to the financial statements, including the key factors and significant assumptions underlying those estimates, and we believe the estimates are reasonable in the circumstances.
24. There are no estimates that may be subject to a material change in the near term that have not been properly disclosed in the financial statements. We understand that near term means the period within one year of the date of the financial statements. In addition, we have no knowledge of concentrations existing at the date of the financial statements that make the Foundation vulnerable to the risk of severe impact that have not been properly disclosed in the financial statements.
25. We are responsible for compliance with the laws, regulations, and provisions of contracts and grant agreements applicable to us; and we have identified and disclosed to you all laws, regulations and provisions of contracts and grant agreements that we believe have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts or other financial data significant to the audit objectives.
26. We have complied with all restrictions on resources (including donor restrictions) and all aspects of contractual and grant agreements that would have a material effect on the financial statements in the event of noncompliance. This includes complying with donor requirements to maintain a specific asset composition necessary to satisfy their restrictions.
27. The internal controls over receipt and recording of received contributions are adequate.
28. The Foundation has classified net assets as without donor restriction or with donor restriction based on its assessment of the donor's intention, as specified in original donor correspondence, when available. When not available, the Foundation used other corroborating evidential matter, including minutes of the board, accounting records, and financial statements. To the extent that it was unable to review original donor correspondence to determine the amount of the original gift and donor additions, its determination of such amount was based on its best estimate considering the relevant facts and circumstances. Amounts classified with donor restriction are subject to donor-imposed purpose or time restrictions that precluded the Foundation from expending such amounts or recognizing such amounts as without donor restriction as of the balance sheet date. Amounts classified as with donor restrictions to be held in perpetuity are subject to donor-imposed or statutory restrictions that require these amounts to be held in perpetuity. In addition, the Foundation has classified appreciation and income related to such donations in accordance with relevant donor or statutory restrictions. Losses on investments of a donor-restricted endowment fund have been classified in accordance with GAAP. Reclassifications between net asset classes are proper.
29. The Foundation has a pledge agreement with a donor. As part of this agreement the Foundation will receive the greater of a guaranteed amount or 50% of the trust upon the death of the donor. The Foundation has recorded the guaranteed amount as a pledge receivable since any amount greater is uncertain at this time.
30. The Foundation is an exempt organization under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Any activities of which we are aware that would jeopardize the organization's tax-exempt status, and all activities subject to tax on unrelated business income or excise or other tax, have been disclosed to you. All required filings with tax authorities are up to date.
31. Management believes that mitigating controls, including departmental review of monthly financial and wage information, are sufficient to address deficiencies in internal control, including access controls, within an acceptable level.

To the best of our knowledge and belief, no events, including instances of noncompliance, have occurred subsequent to the statement of financial position date and through the date of this letter that would require adjustment to or disclosure in the aforementioned financial statements.
